Strong private initiative is needed to make tourism a solid industry and a key factor in the reconstruction efforts. We would appreciate a little more help.

I have a fear of trying something new, but above all, I feel an utmost sense of mission.

I stopped eating lunch out and make my own lunch now. I donate the money saved from this every day.

There are unique ways of local revitalization which only young people can achieve !

There was less rubble and the roads were paved nicely, compared to right after the earthquake. I could really feel the reconstruction in progress while I ran in Oshima.

The large, 397-ton ferry provided a very precious space where citizens could relax.

(President of a shipping company at the ceremony of returning a rented ferry) [Car Ferry Operation Project]

If we can achieve certain results on prior investment for growth, we can use it as a model for community revitalization to energize the whole nation.

[An adviser to the Tohoku Public Benefit Investment Fund]

Our mission is to offer quality support to meet the various needs of disaster victims in coordination with companies, local governments, and local communities, by placing importance on the viewpoint of each victim. [Civic Force]

The second New Year season after the earthquake disaster.

Twenty-one months have passed since the earthquake disaster occurred on March 11, 2011, and we are about to enter the second New Year season. The Great East Japan Earthquake was a complex disaster caused by earthquake, tsunami and a nuclear power plant accident and affected a very wide area. It cruelly demonstrated the formidable power of nature and weakness of mankind.



In disaster-affected areas, so many people are still struggling to take a step forward, saying: "After I lost my loved ones, I didn't know what to do and time has just passed by," or, "After a year and nine months, I don't actually feel that our living conditions have improved." Some people are voicing dissatisfaction such as: "No one at the prefectural government office or the municipality carefully listens to us," or, "National reconstruction policies do not reflect the opinion of citizens."

Reconstruction of disaster-affected areas has a long way to go, because those areas face various challenges such as group relocation, construction of public housing for disaster victims, and employment measures.

"Let's reconstruct our town on our own"

On the other hand, to tackle the piles of issues, some people are looking for ways to reconstruct their town on their own, rather than just relying on the central government or municipalities. "Let's protect our town on our own!" "Let's make our town a place where our children want to live even after they grow up." Civic Force has been working in the disaster-affected areas since right after the earthquake and continued

various support activities, while feeling the kindness and strength of the people in Tohoku.

In this last Monthly Report of 2012, we will summarize our Tohoku support activities to date and report on the overall activities in 2012. In April 2012, we opened an office in Kesennuma City, Miyagi, and started up the "Mid- to Long-Term Reconstruction Support Project." This project will expand the activities of the "NPO Partner Project" and other projects. In October we also started up the "Asia-Pacific Alliance," an international cooperative association, to make use of our Tohoku support experiences in Asia-Pacific regions where disasters occur often.



Looking at our earthquake disaster support activities in numbers

■ Large-scale procurement and delivery of relief supplies ■ (Ended in May 2011)

Total 546 items • 380 tons

We chartered and operated ten 4-ton trucks daily in order to efficiently procure and deliver relief supplies that were needed in disaster-affected areas. We delivered a total of 546 items, weighing 380 tons, to five



disaster-affected areas (Kesennuma City, Minamisanriku Town, Ishinomaki City, Ofunato City, Rikuzentakata City) from March 2011 to May 2011.

■ Installation&operation of handmade baths ■

(※Ended in June 2011)

100 users per day

We installed baths at six sites in Minamisanriku Town, Miyagi, starting on March 30 2011. We installed and operated the baths with the help of local carpenters and volunteer carpenters from



Tokyo, members of the Self- Defense Force, and local residents. These baths were used as “Community Baths” by families on weekends and students after school club activities on weekdays. About 100 people used the baths on daily average.

■ Car Ferry Operation ■

(※Ended in February 2012)

255,000 passengers /55,200 cars

After a car ferry servicing Oshima, an outlying island in Miyagi, was lost by tsunami, Etajima City, Hiroshima, lent a car ferry, “Dream-Noumi”, to Oshima for free, through the assistance of Civic Force. The ferry carried roughly 255,000 passengers and 52,000 cars between Kesennuma and Oshima from April 27, 2011 to February 29, 2012.



■ Provision of multi-purpose mobile bases ■

20 trailer houses

20 container houses

Since June 2011, we have introduced 20 trailer houses and 20 container houses as mobile living spaces for those engaged in reconstruction activities in disaster areas, and lent them to municipalities and other organizations. These bases have been utilized to meet the changing needs, such as offices for NGOs, reconstruction shopping mall and network groups around Kesennuma City, which have been organized in



disaster areas, or as replacements for meeting places for residents association and as school club rooms, which were lost by tsunami.

■NPO Partner Projects■

32 organizations /38 projects

NPO Partner Projects” are implemented by Civic Force in coordination with specialized NPOs and organizations based in disaster areas, for the purpose of meeting the ever-changing needs of those areas. Civic Force has implemented 38 projects with 32 organizations from April 2011 to December 2012, with our staff working in close coordination with those organizations. Each project is examined, monitored and evaluated by outside experts. Progress and details of the projects are open to the public on our website:

■ Employee Volunteer Dispatch Project ■ (※Ended in March 2012) **9 companies /350 volunteers**

We implemented the Employee Volunteer Dispatch Project in Oshima, an outlying island in Kesennuma, Miyagi, from July 2011 to March 2012. Three times each month, a group of company volunteers were dispatched to stay in the island for six days and five nights.



They engaged in programmed tasks such as removing rubbles, cleaning photographs, and helping to make rafts for scallop and oyster farming. A total of 350 employees from nine companies participated in this project.

■ Tohoku Kyoeki Toshi Kikin ■

(Tohoku Common Benefit Investment Fund)

8 cases /2 programs

We established the general incorporated foundation Tohoku Kyoeki Toshi Kikin (Tohoku Common Benefit Investment Fund) in December 2012 to support industrial recovery in disaster-affected areas. As of the end of November 2012, we have invested in seven cases to support the “Common Benefit Projects,” namely, Ogatsu Suzuri Association, Sato Shipyard, Oikawa Electric, Peace Nature Lab, Kamaishi Hikari Foods, Sanriku Iriya Suisan, and Trust. In addition, we are promoting other investment programs such as Reconstruction Venture Capital.



■ Mid- to Long-Term Reconstruction Support Project ■ **4 areas**

We started the “Mid- to Long-Term Reconstruction Support Project” as a new activity in the summer of 2012. This project is an extension of the “NPO Partner Project” and other support activities which we have conducted since immediately after the earthquake. This project supports the reconstruction of disaster areas from mid- to long-term viewpoints. We will utilize our connection with domestic and international companies, NPOs and municipalities to connect the existing support activities together and expand them. Focusing on four core areas, we plan to revitalize the disaster-affected areas from long-term viewpoints by connecting people with people.

■ Revitalizing of tourism

Sanriku Coast, the Pacific coastal area of Tohoku, beautiful scenery and rich fishing ground, tourism is used



to be the second largest industry after fishery. Thus, each municipality along the Sanriku Coast is advocating the “Revitalization of Tourism” in their reconstruction plans and planning measures. In Kesennuma City, where Civic Force has been conducting support activities since immediately after the earthquake, is now viewed as an

opportunity for revitalization, and the goal of making tourism a key industry has been confirmed. For this purpose, "Strategy Meeting for Tourism" has been held since March 2012.

In close cooperation with local banks, Kesennuma City, and companies related to tourism, Civic Force is attempting to create a system for supporting the pioneering projects for revitalization of tourism conducted by NPOs and companies, and to establish and disseminate successful cases.

■ Improving access to medical care

Civic Force is planning to introduce and operate helicopter emergency medical service with local governments, fire departments and local critical care centers in the devastated coastal areas around Kesennuma facing a declining population. We intend to run the service led by the private sector. The goal is to construct the system to dispatch helicopter emergency medical service when a massive disaster occurs as well as to set a lifesaving model case using helicopter in usual time to eliminate inequalities in access to health-care and reduce mortality in the area where highly advanced medical care is not available.



■ Utilizing renewable energy

Nuclear power plant accident triggered to review of natural energy. The renewable energy project is aiming to create jobs and reproduce desolated woodlands near village. We train owners of forest to make money from lumbering and promote biomass (organic plant energy source) fuels made from thinning not suitable for building materials. We attempt to joint supply and



demand together and use "wealth" in the forests effectively in the local area.

Several training programs were held for owners of forest as well as those who want to start forestry as a side business. Civic force will build a lumber yard, and buy thinning in order to stop dropping the price of lumbers and process them to wood biomass fuels, such as firewood and pellet. We promote people living in villages of Kesennuma, who are planning to relocate together to hilltop, to equip a wood stove and a pellet boiler when they build a new house.

■ Support local reconstruction activities

Cooperating with supporters for "NPO Partner Projects," Civic Force has continuously supported constructing projects of local towns led by those who have decided to relocate together. Civic Force will also support urge group relocation projects toward people who has not yet decided to move to other area and to build local communities with disaster prevention.



■ Our accountability

We appreciate your support. The amount of donation for the earthquake reached 1.26 billion yen as of the end of November 2012. Prepared for the next disaster

Disasters occur unexpectedly. When it does occur, “leveraging professional support of various fields” becomes important to save “as many people, as quickly as possible” by promptly obtaining information on damage conditions. In providing support to victims of

the Great East Japan Earthquake, Civic Force has been responding to various needs of the disaster areas under cooperation of approx. 600 companies. Companies, NGOs, and the government each utilized their advantages to materialize a large-scale support providing goods, human resources, and wisdom. Cooperation of local governments and specialized NGOs that can capture needs directly from disaster victims and take action to solve their problems are also indispensable.

Following are reports on the activities in 2012 around the “development of the emergency readiness system” conducted for the next disaster to maximize the “power of linking”, which we experienced after the Great East Japan Earthquake.

Concluded a Disaster Prevention Agreement with Kesennuma City

On Dec. 10, 2012, Civic Force concluded the “Agreement on Support/Cooperation in Disaster Situations” with Kesennuma City, Miyagi Pref. The agreement states to develop procedures for cooperation in times of large-scale natural disasters occurring in Kesennuma City, such as to provide emergency goods and to support victims at evacuation centers; to improve environment of evacuation centers; to support recovery activities and preparing stock; and to conduct emergency drills.

At the gathering after the ceremony, Mr. Shigeru



Sugawara(photo, left), Mayor of Kesennuma City, expressed his appreciation for the help given to various initiatives for recovery from distribution of emergency goods to support in rebuilding communities. In response, Ms. Kaori Neki (photo, right), Executive Director of Civic Force, said, “We have been working by support from all over Japan. By concluding the agreement, we would like to show the significance of the link between the local government and the disaster relief NGO and continue working together in recovery activities.”

Participated in Emergency Drill

On the 1st and 2nd of Sept. 2012, Civic Force participated in the emergency drill of Fukuroi City, Shizuoka



Pref. Since concluding an agreement in 2008 to prepare for large-scale disasters such as the Tokai Area earthquake, Civic Force and Fukuroi City have been cooperating in multiple fields, which include stocking goods, manpower planning, conducting drills, and supporting disaster victims in the Tohoku Area.

In the drill, participants spent the night at the evacuation center to prepare for a long-term stay at evacuation centers. For this experience, Civic Force set up/displayed the temporary shower booths and emergency evacuation tents to demonstrate how they are assembled and used. Another drill with Fukuroi City is scheduled on Mar. 10, 2013.

Interaction with the Maritime Self-Defense Force

■

In June, Civic Force participated in a training program of the staff college of the Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force at Atsugi Base.



The course allowed us to have a better understanding on the disaster relief activities of the Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force, especially the “71st Flight Squadron”, which is responsible for ocean rescue and sending manpower in disasters. We also toured inside of the US-2 rescue flying-boat and museum.

■ Drill conducted at mock disaster Site

Training designated for young staff members of Civic Force are conducted periodically to enable staff to provide prompt and appropriate support in cooperation with disaster victims, rescue teams, doctors, nurses, Self-Defense Force, etc.



■ Consolidating links with Companies, NGOs, and local governments

In preparing for the next large-scale disaster, we are having discussions with supporting-member companies, partner NGOs, private companies, NGOs, and local governments on ways each can cooperate.

■ Expanding to Asia

In 2012, while supporting victims of the Great East Japan Earthquake, the organization strived to create a system to support Asian countries where large-scale disasters frequently occur.

■ Set up the “Asia Pacific Alliance”

Based on the idea of a possibility to set up a system similar to ‘Japan Platform’ in Asia, Civic Force, along with disaster relief organizations of Indonesia, Japan, Korea, the Philippines, and Sri Lanka, worked to set up the “Asia Pacific Alliance for Disaster Management”



(hereafter called “Alliance”, <http://apadm.org/>) in Oct. 2012 to prepare for the frequent disasters occurring in the Asia-Pacific area in recent years. Countries participating in the “Alliance” will establish the “National Platform”, which will provide disaster relief by companies, NGOs, and local governments working under partnership within each country. Further, mutual aid system will be created between these nations by encouraging links within the National Platform.

■ Announced official launch of ministerial-level disaster prevention meeting

The official launch of this “Alliance” was proclaimed at the “5th Asia Ministerial-level Disaster Prevention Meeting” held in Yogyakarta, Indonesia during Oct. 22nd to 25th, 2012. Following the announcement and a press conference, breakout sessions were held; and President Yudhoyono, along with cabinet members of Asia Pacific nations and representatives of disaster prevention organizations, visited the booths.

■ Symposium held at establishment of Asia Pacific Alliance ■

Meanwhile, a symposium of the "Alliance" was held in Tokyo, Japan on Nov. 5 in which more than 130 persons from private companies, national and local governments, NGO, and mass media participated. These activities were made possible by the aid of the Sasakawa Peace Foundation.



■ Supported flood victims in the Philippines ■

Civic Force conducted a fund-raising activity to support the 2.4 million victims of the typhoon and heavy rain in the Philippines, which occurred in July, 2012. With the aid of Japan Platform, we sent 2 staff members to the region from Aug. 20th to 29th and distributed food and blankets to 2,550 households with Citizens' Disaster Response Center (CDRC), a local partner, whom we had contact with even before the Great East Japan Earthquake.

In addition, the south area of the Philippines was hit by Typhoon Bopha between Dec. 4th and 6th resulting in more than 1,000 deaths.

Civic Force received information on the disaster area from CDRC and sent



staff members to Baganga, Davao Province (area with most damage) on Dec. 9 for 10 days. Our staff members cooperated with CDRC, local NPOs, volunteers, and Peace Winds Japan (PWJ) to distribute emergency goods such as food, pots, plastic containers for water, buckets for laundry, and plastic sheets to build temporary houses.

As of Dec. 2012, Civic Force is raising fund for CDRC, which continues to provide support in disaster areas.
